Donation to Milwaukee County Parks a Big Hit

Milwaukee Brewer's All-Star Game MVP first baseman Prince Fielder presented a \$40,000 check to Milwaukee County Parks at the start of the Brewer's game on Saturday, September 24th versus the Florida Marlins.

At the 82nd annual All-Star Game in July, as part of the Chevy Diamond and Dreams Program, Chevrolet announced that as MVP of the game, Prince Fielder would be able to select an organization that could put the \$40,000 donation toward improvement of inner city youth baseball fields. Fielder, while working with the Brewers Community Foundation, selected Milwaukee County Parks as the donation recipient.

Milwaukee County Parks along with the guidance of the Brewers Community Foundation submitted several park locations to Chevrolet where the donation could be used for field improvements. Zablocki Park in Milwaukee, located at 3717 W. Howard Ave., was the site selected by Chevrolet.



Sue Black, Director of Milwaukee County Parks, said, "We are thrilled to be selected by Prince and Chevy for the gracious donation to help improve fields in the inner city. As a park system, we have an opportunity to really make a statement and to further touch the youth of this community."

Play Thriving on International Stage

In September, Musco Lighting leadership, Fran P. Mainella, and Chris Jarvi, traveled to Shanghai China to present on the US Play Coalition, the Gold Medal award program, and the idea of a Global Play Partnership. Their message reached leaders, educators, and facilitators of play and sport at the Shanghai American School, Fudan University, Shanghai Lu Wan Sport Center, and more. They were also able to tour sports centers, local parks, and cultural sites.

Representatives from "Sports for All," a program designed to increase participation in active play will also be attending the conference to share their program ideas, successes, and challenges. These speakers and attendees, in addition to keynote speakers Dr. James Rimmer, Dr. Geoffrey Godbey, and Dr. Bernard Griesemer, will make the 2012 Conference on the Value of Play the best one yet!

Academy Member Perspective

Re-Thinking Certification (CPRP)

Certification is not working well...but it could.

The parks and recreation industry is a *coalition* of professions – recreation programmers, foresters, recreation therapists, financial specialists, aquatic leaders, management specialists, and on and on. It's impossible for one certification size to fit all, unless certification is so watered down as to be irrelevant. Like it or not, that's where we are. The good news is that it is entirely fixable.

Recent improvements to certification are commendable as steps in the right direction. Now let's pursue the next, logical steps. Let's begin to build useful categories and replace the multiple choice test with real world evidence of ability and accomplishment.

The American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) may be a model to emulate. It has eight (8) certification specialties. AOTA also recognizes the professional development and education involved in teaching, writing, on-the-job-training, etc. There is not a multiple choice test.

In public parks and recreation, we can easily make certification more enticing by making it more applicable to our diversity of professional pursuits. Allow for special certifications to reflect our diversity. Allow a person to hold multiple certifications. Allow for increasing levels of mastery.

AOTA's eight specialties are as follows: *Gerontology, Mental Health, Pediatrics, Physical Re-hab, Driving, Environment Modification, Feeding/Swallowing, and Low Vision*. In each of these areas, an Occupational Therapist may pursue a basic level certification or a master's level certification.

Just as an example, the park and recreation industry could have certification paths for *Parks, Recreation Programming, Facility, Fiscal, Agency Leadership, Special Populations Recreation, Natural Resources and Environmental, and Aquatic (which now exists as AFO).* The newly formed networks within NRPA would be likely vehicles to create the criteria for these special categories.

To further acknowledge the experiential nature of public parks and recreation, we have to put more value on accomplishment over testing and sitting in classrooms. Most education comes on the job – pushing yourself, trying and failing, and networking. It's imperative that we harness the value of experiential learning and growth.

To make parks and recreation certification a true mark of proficiency, we have to change it to match our realities. Let's emulate other professions and vocations that address their diversity, provide tiers of expertise, and measure on-the-job growth. If we are not up to that task, let's just drop the whole thing.
